Cheryl is one of two Block Watch Captains for the Haliday and Fandell blocks. Recently we became aware of another Block Watch for the waterside neighbourhoods of Departure Bay Rd. This excellent crime prevention initiative sees a 40% decrease in theft for neighbourhoods with Block Watch signage. Wardropper Park Outdoor Classroom

Mrs. Thompson and Mrs.Larsen along with their Grades 6 and 7 classes from Departure Bay Eco Elementary School are working in partnership with the city to clean up an unkept area of Wardropper Park. They worked hard to remove invasive species, clean up trash, trimmed back walking paths and also did some planting. The city came in and removed some dead and invasive trees. During their clean-up, the students came across a number of agricultural items that really sparked their curiosity. They researched the history of the Wardropper family who donated the land, and also did an historical

The classes raised money to purchase a plaque and buried a time capsule. Their plan is to continue working on invasive removal but also establish some learning areas out of logs and



stumps. Mrs. Thompson keenly exclaimed "aside from the learning spaces, it's also just a great wild space too. It's different from other city parks with well-kept paths and designated walking areas. There are all kinds of loose parts for building, designing, and all kinds of creative play. The students can play where ever they want, move things around, and during each visit, there is always something new to discover".

This space was planned and cared for with not only the students in mind, but with the larger Departure Bay Community. "We did it with them in mind. Our vision is to see it as a community space as well".
